## From the Pastor

# When was the last time Jesus astounded and amazed you?



Who is Jesus? This is the underlying question in the Gospel of Mark. Each of the gospel stories depict a different first ministry experience for Jesus, after the call of the initial disciples. In

Matthew, Jesus taught the crowds in what is now known as the Sermon on the Mount, a disciples' training manual. In Luke, Jesus read from Isaiah during a synagogue service, and then proclaimed the prophecy fulfilled in himself and his ministry, his mission statement. In John, Jesus turned water into wine as the first sign of several signs that pointed to the glory of Jesus. In Mark, Jesus taught in the synagogue with authority and exorcizes an unclean spirit with authority. Authority is an important aspect of understanding who Jesus is.

For Mark, the question does not lead to answers of theological precision. He doesn't devote great energy toward establishing a clear understanding of Jesus' nature, unlike for example the Gospel of John. Instead, Mark depicts Jesus as the one uniquely authorized, commissioned, and empowered to declare and institute the reign of God.

Through Jesus we glimpse characteristics of this reign. It is intrusive, breaking old boundaries that benefited another kind of rule. It is about liberating people from the powers that afflict them and keep all creation – including human bodies and human societies – from flourishing. This astounded and amazed the people in that synagogue in Mark's story.

When was the last time Jesus

astounded and amazed you? Can you

recall a time in the recent past when the presence of God in your life caught your attention and held it? These days of wilderness are rough, unlikely days for astonishment and amazement at the coming of the reign of God. Nearly one year into this COVID pandemic and many of us are battling deep and persistent melancholy, unease, discontent. We're weary, anxious, dejected, bored. We're too worried about the future to live attentively in the present. Time drags on in soggy shapelessness, or flies at breakneck speed as we struggle to multitask under face masks, death tolls, mutations, and quarantines. Church is still online, so our access to

spiritual community, space, ritual, and sacrament is limited.

Is it possible for us to experience astonishment and amazement as we journey in this wilderness? Where is the voice of authority, power, grace and healing that can snap us back unto full and vibrant living, now? Mark thought it possible in Jesus and Jesus is the voice of authority.

...What is this? A new teaching — with authority! He (Jesus) commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him ...

Mark I:27

Choose love, compassion, and kindness. Do justice; make peace. Be the light of Christ in this world of darkness. Persevere in prayer.




