From the Pastor



A few years ago, Barbara and I saw the movie, "Tomorrowland." It is a science fiction mystery adventure film that tells the story of Frank, a former boy genius (George Clooney – a

former heartthrob playing a cranky middle-aged man!), and Casey, a gifted teenager (Britt Robertson), who set out on a dangerous mission to unearth the secrets of "Tomorrowland," an enigmatic utopia-like location caught between time and space. Frank is jaded by disillusionment and Casey is a bright optimistic teen bursting with scientific curiosity. Barbara and I found the movie entertaining – especially as two baby boomers who grew up with Disneyland's innovation-inspired Tomorrowland.

Frank's disillusionment has led him to become a recluse. Yet, within his home is a high-tech room surrounded by monitors that project all of the world's problems. One can imagine that there wouldn't be enough monitors to show all of the problems, but the visual powerfully reflects the many challenges, issues and calamities facing the world. Frank seems to spend his life reinforcing his disillusionment and bitterness trapped in hopelessness and despair. It is obviously the sum of his thoughts. This scene alone is enough to question our addiction to the 24 hour news cycle. Casey is the protagonist who seeks to draw Frank out of his selfimposed bondage by offering a vision of hope.

The problems facing the world, our communities, our church, our families and relationships, can be intimidating and overwhelming. It is easy to identify and diagnose problems; it is harder to find and enact solutions. It is easy to allow disillusion and bitterness to define our lives; it is harder to allow hope to lift us up into a new day. It is easier to be critical; it is harder to risk change. In the process we allow a cheap imitation of hope, hope of returning to a day or time gone by, to deceive us. But hope is not the promise of going back to an idealized recollection; it is the promise of going forward into a new day, despite the presence of challenge and problem.

Jesus offers us this hope. In the life, death, resurrection, and reign of Christ, the kingdom of God is bursting into our midst, not as an enigmatic utopian-like mystery, but as the concrete reality of God's will. Our hope is not based on what we can do to get our act together, on the world stage, in our church, or in our lives; our hope is based upon what Jesus has done, is doing, and will do.

The movie leaves the message that those who dream of a better world

are the ones who can connect with the hope of tomorrowland. Our connection to the hope of God's kingdom is through a life of following Jesus in faith, love, and joy. As a youth I remember singing, "Let There Be Peace on Earth." "Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me." The Bible calls for us to be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we can discern the will of God. (Romans 12:2) I am not suggesting that we embrace a privatized inner faith of retreat as a response to challenge and problem. On the contrary, I am suggesting that we are best prepared for and most effective against those challenges, whether on the world stage, in the church or in our families and relationships, by allowing Christ to continually form us into his likeness through prayer, study, worship, community, and service. In this is the resurrection of hope that empowers, guides, delivers, and lifts up.

The challenges in the world, for the church, and of our lives are many. A hope of naivety will not do, nor will the resignation of disillusionment or bitterness. However, the hope born of God through Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit is a whole other matter!
