The way it looks from here...

Dear Friends,

Summer is here with family vacations; the desire for more air conditioning than

we've needed before; and a little ice cream after dinner. I want you to know that, though vacations and ice cream will be worked in to the schedule, your Session is hard at work thinking and dreaming and praying over the future of Faith United. Several projects are in work. I want to let you in on some of the forward-thinking work that is happening.

At a special meeting in April and the regular May meeting of Presbytery, a new initiative was announced that your Session has decided to participate in. It is called "New Beginnings." New Beginnings is about taking a look at ourselves as a church. Taking stock of both our strengths and weaknesses and identifying our opportunities for growth and ministry. New Beginnings takes place in steps. First, a general assessment of the church will be conducted. This assessment, among other things, looks at the leadership, finances, facilities and programs of Faith United. It also will look at the demographics of the area in which the church

resides, asking several questions. Is the neighborhood growing? What are the categories of people who reside in the neighborhood, such as age, ethnicity, economic status, etc? What are the likely needs of the neighborhood residents? There will also be a time when the members of the congregation will be asked to participate in the assessment process to gauge what the needs and goals of you,

the members, are. Finally, using the assessment report, the training of leaders, and small group meetings with the congregation, all

conducted with much prayer a new sense of direction for the church will be sought. We will have a chance to decide "Who it is that God wants us to do and be?"

I am excited about the chance this offers us to look at new possibilities for the future of Faith United. I hope that you will participate when the opportunities presents itself.

Also, I want you to know that Little Treasures has approached us about the possibility of building additional space for growth of the pre-school operation. We are actively in discussions with the

Yost's about what this might mean for their relationship with Faith United and our ministry and to better utilize the property with which we are blessed.

In addition, the Vision Team which was formed consisting of members of CSID and Faith United is actively engaged in dreaming about how the two churches, working together, can meet its space needs going forward. In the

near future we hope to be interviewing architects for the purpose of developing plans for expansion.

Of course, all of the

above things always take longer to accomplish than any of us would like. But, careful thought should be given to these key decisions. Look and listen for more information as to these developing efforts and how you might participate in them.

I remain excited about the future of Faith United. I look forward to our praying and working together. Let us listen for God's word for us, as to what we are to do and who we are to be as followers of Jesus.

Spotlight on Marilyn Rose!

"If you learn at an early age to entertain yourself, you always know how to have fun."

This quote came from a woman who learned at a young age how to entertain herself on her grandfather's farm in Indiana. He built a trapeze for her in his barn and she flew through the air, hung upside down, and landed in fresh hay. She knew how to have fun! Raised just after the Great Depression,

she was born in Boston, Indiana where she lived with her parents and a brother, Charles, and sister, Flora Jane Marie. Her family moved to Ohio while she was still a young child. She describes her early family as close, and they still are in touch quite often.

Marilyn Rose's family moved back to Evansville, Indiana when her father was transferred due to his work. She finished the rest of her schooling and graduated from high school there. During this time, she played piano and string bass and became accomplished enough to win a music scholarship to Evansville College. After one year at Evansville College, her father was notified of a transfer to San Antonio, TX. He gave her the opportunity to continue her studies at Evansville, or transfer to The University of Texas. Since practicing her instruments was a tremendous burden due to the requirements of her scholarship, she told me she jumped at the chance to transfer.

While at UT, she studied radio and TV, a new program at the school, and a growing industry in the US. She was in the first graduating class that earned degrees in radio and TV. She told me that was back in the days when "women were not supposed to do things in the world". At the invitation of one of her professors, she joined him to work in Lubbock, TX at the local TV station. This entry level position provided her with a broad base of administrative learning experiences. Among her other duties, she also did live commercials "just like Betty Furness".

Her television career continued after moving back to Evansville where she took a job at a new TV station that was just getting started. There she was a "jack of all trades" who wrote copy, did commercials, directed other people, and became Program Director of the station. All that trapeze flying was good training for the high flying work she was doing in a brand new industry.

She also met her future husband, Jim Rose, in Evansville. Actually, they met in high school when he tripped her while she was

looking for a seat in class. She said, "I literally fell for him at first sight." It was not love at first sight for them, however. She told me that he followed her around and tried to get her attention, but she considered him "just a friend", no one to be serious about. That all changed when she went back to Evansville to work. They reunited at that time and fell in love and married. He was in the army and part of the occupation of Germany following

WWII, and had to be away during the first year of their married life. She continue to work, saved all her money, and bought furniture for the home they would establish together when he returned.

Marilyn and Jim, who is now deceased, have four children: Sheryl, Rhonda, Jeff, and Denise. Her son, Jeff, lives with her in her comfortable home in Carrollton, and they have family gatherings with the other siblings who live in this area. She is the proud grandmother to 13, and great-grandmother to 4.

She and Jim raised their children in the Christian faith as Presbyterians. She has taught them to put God first in their lives, and when dealing with other people to "never judge a book by its cover." She tries to practice patience and give others time to show her who they really are inside. She appreciates sincerity in others, and says that with patience, she can see through people who pretend to be what they are not. She values empathy and tries to practice it by smiling when she meets someone to put away their fears. She practices introducing herself first and listens to others as they talk. She values the church as a haven from the outside world and a place to worship God with other believers.

She has been active in the community in Carrollton Women's Club, where she was president of that organization for 3 years. She also served on the Carrollton Library Board and worked in the local school system. She enjoys playing bridge, reading, and attending movies, plays and concerts with friends and family.

Marilyn serves now as the vice moderator of Presbyterian Women at FUPC. She used her well-honed organizing skills this year to put together the successful women's retreat that was held at the former Covenant Presbyterian Church building in Carrollton, TX. Presbyterian Women in our church are still talking about how this gathering brought together a large number of women that included present and former members...a contribution to our community of which Marilyn can be proud.

Give Your Family a Break...Consider the Conversation

"Consider The Conversation, a documentary on a taboo subject" is an award winning film that addresses several important life issues that most people have trouble talking about. It focuses on that troublesome time that comes to all of us sooner or later, the end of life here on earth.



The producers of this documentary conducted more than 100 interviews over the course of 14 months, with patients, family members, doctors, nurses, social workers, clergy and end of life care experts from around the county. Their aim was to provide an all inclusive perspective on what it means to die in 21st century America.

The goals of those who brought us "Consider the Conversation" are straightforward. .. to change the commonly held American attitude that views end-of-life as a "failed medical event" to one that sees it as a normal process with opportunity for human development, to inspire conversations between patient and doctor, husband and wife, parent and child, minister and parishioner... and to change behavior by encouraging professionals to take the lead in counseling others during this critical time.

Faith United Presbyterian Church is very fortunate to be able to bring this thoughtful 60-minute film to our church. We will pre-

sent it on July 17th from 5 to 7 p.m. The film will be followed by a discussion period led by Valerie Sanchez from Faith Hospice. She is the Director of Bereavement and Integrated Therapies for Faith Hospice and has much experience in the field.

We will follow this first session with an-

other on July 31st at 5 p.m. to discuss living wills, power of attorney, and last wishes for funeral arrangements. If desired, participants will have the opportunity to fill out the forms for these important documents with guidance from professionals.

This will be an excellent time for you to think about how you want to influence the end of your life. No one relishes this thought, but dying comes to all of us and leaving documents with your wishes for your own death are a blessing to those left behind who are grieving at losing you.

The Ministry of Listening

Listening is one of the most powerful ministry tools at your disposal. It demonstrates that you care about the other person. In Stephen Ministry, a great deal of time is spent in teaching and practicing listening skills because of its importance as a caregiving tool. You too can become a more caring listener by understanding and applying these six listening concepts from Stephen Ministry training:

- 1) **Listening is active.** Focus your attention on what the other person has to say instead of thinking of what you'll say next. Look at him or her while you listen, and nod along from time to time so the person knows you're tuned in.
- 2) Listening takes patience. Often you need to build trust before someone will open up to you. Constant, patient listening is a key.
- 3) **Listening involves more than just words.** Pay attention not only to what is said, but to what is not said. Pay attention to body language, too.
- 4) **Good listeners aren't completely silent.** They restate key thoughts or ideas to be sure they understood correctly or ask focused questions to encourage the person to reach a little deeper.
- 5) **Listening happens over time.** One conversation might build upon an earlier one. Themes or patterns may occur leading to deeper conversations.
- 6) **Listening is confidential.** A great way to build trust and to show the person you really care is to maintain confidentiality and not to share with others what was told to you in private conversation.

We all want Faith United to be a caring place where members and guests truly feel people care about who they are and how they feel. Just as our Stephen Ministers use good listening skills to communicate how much they care, so can you. Follow and practice these listening principles and make a concentrated effort toward becoming a better listener. Listening is a great gift we can give to one another, and one we can all use in order to make Faith United a more caring place.
