From the Pastor

One year ago, Barbara and I were able to visit Scotland with our children. Scotland in late November means days with little sunshine. Sunrise each day was after 8:30 am and sunset

occurred before 4 pm. The fascinating part of these short days of sunshine is the location of the sun in the sky. It sits very low in the southern sky. In fact, there were several days when I was disoriented about direction. Usually I am very good about knowing direction. However, when the sun sits as low as it does in Scotland in the winter, there were times when I wasn't sure if I was looking east, west or south. Even at midday the sun sat so low it looked like a setting sun, or was it a rising sun?

As we begin the season of Advent, I think about the disorientation we experience in our everyday lives. There is so much that can be so troubling, in our lives, in our families, in our relationships, in our community, in our country, and in our world. Sometimes it can make us wonder, where is God? Advent acknowledges the present

darkness of evil, sin and brokenness. Of all the seasons of the church year,
Advent most closely mirrors our daily lives, asks the most important ethical questions, presents the most accurate picture of the human condition, and above all, orients us to the future of the God who will come again. Advent looks beyond history and awaits
Christ's coming again "in glory to judge the living and the dead."

Yet, we must also recognize the importance of Advent for life in the present. Advent is not Christmas. We often think of Advent as a time

of preparation for Christmas. This is misleading and insufficient. Advent can become a religious veneer for our efforts of planning and experiencing our idealized Christmas. We live in the time between the first coming of Christ, incognito in the stable in Bethlehem, and his second coming, in glory, to judge the living and the dead. Advent contains within itself the crucial balance of the now and the not-yet that our faith requires. The disappointment,

brokenness, suffering, and pain that characterize life in this present world is held in dynamic tension with the promise of future glory that is yet to come, in which judgment is taken up into promise and hope.

Advent is a time of reorientation. It is the opportunity to perceive where in the world the activity of God can be discerned. Our gaze is directed to the promise and hope of a new day, and,

at the same time, to this present moment, imperfect yet beloved, fragile yet important, flawed yet beautiful, the very time and moment in which God chooses to meet, love, and redeem us. This year we will hear the voices of

prophets speak, "The Prophetic Hope of Advent." Into the darkness comes the light – the light of the world, God with Us. We wait, we prepare, we anticipate, we long, we live, we love. Let's allow Advent to be God's gift to us of orientation – God's loving and saving presence – in days of disorientation.
